

Corrections & Clarifications:

- Olmsted designed Sudbrook in 1889, not 1884.
- Neither Olmsted nor the Sudbrook Company planned Sudbrook Park as a summer community.
- Most early homes in Sudbrook were built for year-round use; only a few were built strictly as "summer homes."
- The Western Maryland Railroad played no part in the development of Sudbrook Park. Sudbrook was developed by a group of primarily Boston and Philadelphia capitalists.
- The 1973 Sudbrook Park National Register District contained about 90 acres, not 200.
- The Sudbrook hotel burned to the ground in 1926; it was not torn down in 1930.
- Frederick Law Olmsted, Sr. was not involved in the design of Roland Park. His son, Frederick Law Olmsted, Jr. and the Olmsted firm designed Plats 2 and 3 of Roland Park after 1895.
- Olmsted's name has no "a" in it.
