Single Stream Recycling Begins on Feb. 1st

Beginning on February 1st, County residents will be putting all of their recyclables (*paper, bottles, cans*) into the same container which will be collected each week. The container may be a recycling container, trash container marked with an "X" or "RECYCLE," or a cardboard box. **Note: Recyclables placed in plastic bags will no longer be collected.**

All of the following items can now be recycled:

Metal – aluminum and steel food and beverage cans, empty aerosol cans, aluminum foil, and pie pans; **Glass** – all glass jars and bottles; **Plastic** – narrow neck bottles and jugs with recycling numbers 1-7, wide mouthed containers, such as butter, cottage cheese, peanut butter, and yogurt containers; rigid plastic such as buckets, drinking cups and flower pots; **Paper** – Newspapers (*including all inserts*), magazines, phone books, catalogs, books, writing and computer paper, mail, paperboard (*e.g. cereal, frozen food, and shoe boxes*), flattened cardboard, milk and juice cartons/boxes. Do your part to pitch-in!

President's Message

As I'm sure many of you are aware by now, a pedestrian was killed by a motorist several months ago while walking on Sudbrook Lane in Ralston. Much of Sudbrook Lane, particularly in Sudbrook Park, has no footpath, making it very dangerous for pedestrians to use. Here's an update on some of things your community association is working on, in order to make Sudbrook Lane a safer place for pedestrians.

We're hoping to get funding (*through the county's Capital Improvement Program*) to add a section of footpath to Sudbrook Lane along the "entranceway" area to our community, near the bridge. We're also looking into the feasibility of installing custom-made signs on Sudbrook Lane, instructing motorists to slow down (*similar to what you see on Cross Country Road in Mt. Washington*).

As far as speed humps are concerned, Sudbrook Lane, unfortunately, is the victim of arcane rules concerning where speed humps may and may not be installed in the county. Because Sudbrook Lane connects Reisterstown Road and Milford Mill, it's considered a "collector," and, as such, is not eligible for speed humps (*ironically, busier streets with higher speed limits, such as Church Lane in Randallstown with a 30 mph limit, already have speed humps*). Speed cameras have been suggested as well, but if you've had a chance to see what they look like, you might think twice about wanting the county to install these unseemly devices in our historic community.

One of the most dangerous sections of Sudbrook Lane for pedestrian traffic is the "S" curve beginning at the 3-way intersection Sudbrook Lane, Windsor Road, and

Sudbrook Road in particular, westbound vehicles that continue on to Sudbrook Road. (*instead of turning through the "S" curve*) often achieve very high speeds. Ten year's worth of traffic accident data that we've managed to obtain from the Baltimore County Police Department confirm that this is an extremely dangerous location. The county has offered some suggestions to our Bridge Roads and Traffic Committee on how they might reconfigure this intersection for us in an effort to slow down traffic, but their proposals, so far, seem inadequate and/or compromise the original design of our community. This location would also be a logical choice for a stop sign (*for vehicles traveling westbound on Sudbrook*), but, again, getting the county to agree to such an installation is no easy matter. But at least we're having a conversation with the county on all of the issues and, at some point, we hope, they will be resolved in a favorable manner.

On a happier note, our wonderful new Sudbrook Park website is attracting lots of visitors. 480 unique people visited the site in the last quarter of 2009 alone, and 78 percents of these visits were new visits, including 26 visits where people got referred to us while visiting Wikipedia! This is no doubt helping to put our little neighborhood on the map. Kudos to all who worked so hard to make this such a fine and professional looking product. Five of the ASPCA's Top 10 Tips for Cold Weather

- During the winter, outdoor cats sometimes sleep under the hoods of cars to keep warm. When the motor is started, the cat can be injured or killed by the fan belt. Bang loudly on the car hood before starting the engine to give the cat a chance to escape.
- Never let your dog off the leash on snow or ice, especially during a snowstorm – dogs can lose their scent and easily become lost. *More dogs are lost during the winter than during any other season*, so make sure yours always wears ID tags.
- Thoroughly wipe off your dog's legs and stomach when he comes in out of the sleet, snow or ice. He can ingest salt, antifreeze or other potentially dangerous chemicals while licking his paws, and his paw pads may also bleed from snow or encrusted ice.
- Never shave your dog down to the skin in winter, as a longer coat will provide more warmth. When you bathe your dog in the colder months, be sure to completely dry him before taking him out for a walk. Own a short-haired breed? Consider getting him a coat or sweater with a high collar or turtleneck with coverage from the base of the tail to the belly. For many dogs, this is regulation winter wear.
- Puppies do not tolerate the cold as well as adult dogs, and may be difficult to housebreak during the winter. If your puppy appears to be sensitive to the weather, you may opt to paper-train him inside. If your dog is sensitive to the cold due to age, illness or breed type, take him outdoors only to relieve himself.

In addition, it is a common misconception that your dog will be fine left outside in all weather conditions. But, except for a few breeds – e.g. huskies – most dogs are not designed for frigid weather. The University of Minnesota Department of Veterinary Medicine suggests you **not** leave your pet outdoors unattended for long periods anytime the temperature drops below freezing. Dogs under such conditions are susceptible to both hypothermia and frostbite.

Time to Place Your Tree Order for Spring 2010!

As you may know, the Tree Replenishment Program was started to assist Sudbrook Park residents in adding to and maintaining the dwindling oak tree canopy which gives our community much of its charm and adds value to our homes.

Many properties have lost trees through weather events, disease and natural aging. Trees have always been one of Sudbrook Park's most attractive and important features and early Spring is the ideal planting time. If you are interested in purchasing a new tree or trees for your property, please call **Ed Brady at 410-653-6329** as soon as possible since our tree order must be placed in early February. Trees usually are delivered in early March.

We do not know the exact prices yet for this year, but in the past, a 5'-6' tree usually cost about \$25-35. Planting assistance is available, if needed, upon request. Please call Ed Brady to place your order now. Help replenish the community's tree canopy. Don't delay!

Secondary School Options for Your Child:

(This is the second in a series of articles outlining various public secondary school alternatives for children living in Sudbrook Park.)

Baltimore Polytechnic Institute and Baltimore City College

In addition to the many fine high school programs offered in the Baltimore County School system, County residents can apply into the *Baltimore City* Public School system to take advantage of schools there, among them Baltimore Poly-technic Institute and Baltimore City College, two award-winning high schools.

Founded in 1883, Baltimore Polytechnic Institute, or "Poly," specializes in science, technology, science, and engineering. Poly is home to the Ingenuity Project, an accelerated, rigorous magnet program for students with a passion for science and math. Ingenuity students in 2008 achieved a combined average score of 1352 on the math and critical reading sections of the SAT out of a possible 1600 and the classes of 2001-1008 received over \$17 million in college scholarships. Several Ingenuity students have been winners of the national Intel Science competition. (www.bpi.edu)

Baltimore City College, "City," founded in 1839, offers a full range of academic courses including advanced placement and the rigorous International Baccalaureate (IB) Diploma Program. This program is a challenging two-year curriculum, primarily aimed at students aged 16 to 19. It leads to a qualification that is widely recognized by the world's leading universities. County students attending City schools must apply to the City school system in the fall of the preceding year of desired admission, provide their own transportation and pay tuition. The current year's tuition is \$3850.
