Check Your Trees this Fall for Ivy!

The fall is a great time to remove unwanted ivy from you trees. That's because the colder the weather gets, the more likely it is that the ivy on your tree will die once you cut the roots at the base of the your tree. Not only does ivy transmit disease to the tree, but it also deprives its leaves of needed sunlight, and burdens the entire tree with its weight, making lower limbs susceptible to breaking-off during storms. Typically, as the vines grow up the tree, the tree eventually loses its lower limbs, leaving a "broccoli head" canopy at the remaining top part. To protect your tree, cut the roots of the ivy at the tree's base, and also try to remove as many of the vines as you can from the trunk. In most cases, if the infestation is not extreme, this should suffice to kill the plant, although it may continue to live off of the tree bark for a few more months.

Sudbrook Park is renowned for its beautiful tree canopy. And in addition to enhancing the beauty of our neighborhood, this canopy keeps the Park significantly cooler in the summer! Please do your part to protect our tree canopy by checking your trees for uncontrolled ivy infestation!

A sampling of what Sudbrook Park, Inc. has done for the community over the past 13 years:

If you moved here recently, you may not realize the enormous amount of work the community association did, with the county and on its own, getting the following projects and goals in our Community Plan implemented:

- 1. Got a new and corrected historical marker installed.
- 2. Held periodic community activities focusing on Sudbrook's history -- walking tours, talks and slide presentations, major events. Next up: 2014=125th Anniversary.
- 3. Nominated additional areas to the County Landmark's list--Adana Rd.
- 4. Encouraged county elected officials to strengthen the County Landmarks Commission and staff to better protect historic resources and assist residents.
- 5. After 10-years of work, got a rehabbed entranceway bridge that preserves our one-lane entrance and improved sight-line visibility; bridge to be repainted soon.
- 6. Got roads in the entranceway area restored to their previous, pre-Metro line (narrower) width.
- 7. Got a more historically appropriate edge treatment in the entranceway.
- 8. Obtained grants, county funds and used funds association raised for several entranceway plantings -- still need corrections to soil, remove dead trees and re-planting, which should include more evergreens.
- 9. After many years of work, were able to get speed humps installed by the county to help reduce speeding on Sudbrook Lane.
- 10. Got triangle installed at Kingston, Windsor and Adana and a grant to landscape it; hope to have Upland/Sudbrook Lane triangle size restored with rolled curb and additional plantings.
- 11. Worked to get unsafe intersection at Howard/Upland/Woodside reconfigured.
- 12. Developed Landscaping Guidelines for Public Spaces in Sudbrook Park (Appendix J of Plan).
- 13. Have been planting trees in the community for years and trying to encourage homeowners to replenish and add to our tree canopy -- more always needs to be done.
- 14. As a result of our Community Plan, the county completed water main replacement and sewer relining in several areas of our community and also added some new storm drains.
- 15. Worked with BGE and got them to upgrade several transmission lines, decrease loads, add transformers, improving outage problems in areas that experienced them most often. We also worked with them on tree trimming. That was some years ago and improvements may be needed again.
- 16. Continue to work to maintain the residential nature of our community and have a standing zoning committee. It addresses issues as they arise and as they come to our attention.
- 17. Were able to get Sudbrook Park covered by the county's residential design review guideline requirement for significant new additions or in-fill. Ruxton is the only other county community with similar requirements.
- 18. Public safety: we inform residents of break-ins and other safety issues by email and in the newsletter.
- 19. Sudbrook Stream Valley Park was completely rehabbed as a result of our Community Plan and committee work. State and county monies went to fund this \$500,000 project, along with many resident donations for special features such as our name bricks, benches, etc.
- 20. Purchased, installed and maintain street signs more appropriate to our historic community; had 3 new community entranceway signs made.

Baltimore County Public School Magnet Program

Magnet programs are schools that offer specialized courses or curricula for students. In Baltimore County, there are magnet programs available for elementary, middle and high school. Many of our residents are familiar with **Sudbrook Magnet Middle School**, but are not as familiar with the county's Magnet Elementary Programs, including how to qualify and apply.

To qualify for the elementary magnet program, there is an application process and then a random lottery process used to fill available seats in the school.

The application process is not difficult, but does require meeting deadlines and following the instructions in order to avoid automatic disqualification. **Currently, there are six elementary magnet schools in Baltimore County:**

Chatsworth School (Reisterstown);

Church Lane Elementary Technology School (Randallstown);

Cromwell Valley Elementary Regional Magnet School (Towson);

Halstead Academy (Parkville);

Lutherville Laboratory for Science, Mathematics, and Communications

(Lutherville); and

Wellwood International School (Pikesville)

Baltimore County Public schools provide transportation to and from elementary magnet programs for students who reside in the established zone of the magnet program.



By the numbers!

- 100+ Number who attend our annual July 4th and Holiday Tree Events

For 105 years, Sudbrook Park has had a community association dependent on its members and volunteers.

In the 1970s and 80s, when Sudbrook was fighting a 6-lane expressway and then a Metro-line cutting through the community, we had over 350 member families. For most of the past three decades, we've had 200-250 member families. More recently, after ending the door-to-door drive, numbers fell to 150 and then 125. Now, we stand at 59 members—a startlingly low number. What has happened?



- many of our long-standing members have moved;
- many new residents are unaware of exactly what and how much the community association has done and continues to do;
- membership is voluntary, so all residents can enjoy the benefits of the work the community association does without becoming a member or paying dues;
- the association no longer collects annual dues door-to-door; and
- many people intend to join, then get busy and forget.

Here's what our community would look like without Sudbrook Park, Inc:

Our recently rehabbed one-way bridge at the Sudbrook Lane entranceway would be a 4-lane-wide bridge across a 6-lane expressway with Metro line in the median, and cars would be speeding down a much wider Sudbrook Lane at 50+ mph regularly. We wouldn't have the beautiful new park/playground we do have, or many other civic improvements the community association worked on.

Our triangles, or what would be left of them, would have high grass and weeds, because the county would mow only 2-3 times a year. The community wouldn't have the wonderful holiday parades— July 4th, Halloween—and events (flower & bake sale, Santa arriving on the fire truck, our sparkling Holiday Tree, cookies and cider after the tree lighting) that make Sudbrook Park so special.

Do you wait for Spring Dumpster Day to toss your throwaways? You wouldn't have that convenience. Do you take your complaints about speeding to our Traffic Committee? Report grass two-feet high, trash and other code violations to our Zoning Committee? If you're new to the community, did you receive a helpful information packet from our Welcoming Committee? Have you gotten information about the landmarks approval process or historic tax credit from our local landmarks committee? You'd have none of these. Realtors say that attractive, interesting websites help sell houses. Check out www.sudbrookpark.org -- we think you'll agree it's one of the best community websites you'll find.

STAY SAFE

Police advise us that "Deception Burglaries" are on the rise throughout the area. This is where men or women come to the door, claiming to be from BGE (or other legitimate companies), often wearing reflective vests, "ID badges" and carrying official-looking papers. They say they are there to check your meter, collect a bill, discuss lower rates, or do some work but these may be scams. The police have received reports of some of these fake-BGE reps in our area.

BGE, Verizon, and Comcast generally notify homeowners in advance by letter if they will be sending anyone to your house or will have people working in your area.

If representatives come to your home claiming they are from BGE, CALL BGE to verify that the company sent them and don't let them in until you are certain that they are legitimate. Police advise residents to check with the company (BGE etc.) and to ask for credentials before admitting anyone to your home. If you are see anyone or anything suspicious, call 911.

Donations of Gently Used and Not So Gently Used Items

We all get those phone calls from charitable organizations asking for "gently worn" clothing. But what about the "not so gently worn" stuff you may want to get rid of? You know, torn underwear, socks

with holes, torn shirts, stained blouses, ripped stockings, and the like? Is there some alternative to putting all this stuff in the trash and having it go to a landfill? The answer is, yes, indeed! Many large charitable organizations like Goodwill and Salvation Army will usually accept textiles that are not suitable for resale. That's because these organizations turn around and sell this fabric to textile wholesalers, where the final product often ends up all over the world as yarn. The following information, for example, was found on the website earth99.com: "As a general rule, there isn't much that we won't allow to be donated to Goodwill," Michael Meyer, vice president of donated retail goods at Goodwill Industries International, Inc., told Earth911. "We take all textiles in any condition. All those textiles end up in our system and they're sorted to determine where they will land." The misconception that worn and damaged clothing items cannot be accepted by charities like Goodwill stems from the use of the term "gently used items," which was a tagline for charities seeking donations for many years.

Another organization that is more than happy to take your fabric remnants is DeBois Textiles and



Remnants, located on Washington Blvd in Baltimore City, just off I95, across from the old Montgomery Ward building. Currently, fabric represents about 5% of landfill material. There's really no need for fabric to go in a landfill, even if it is torn, worn out, or stained. So the next time want to get rid of old or damaged fabric, consider donating!
