

Spay and Neuter Clinic

To reduce pet overpopulation, the Maryland SPCA provides high-quality, low-cost, high-volume spay/neuter surgery for cats and dogs to **qualified groups** and pet owners (check www.mdspca.org for how to qualify for the low-cost program, or call 410-235-8826). Prices are from \$40 to \$75.The Maryland SPCA advocates spaying and neutering of all pets to combat animal overpopulation. Altering dogs and cats can dramatically reduce the risk of developing certain types of cancers. Additionally, altered dogs and cats are less likely to wander and become lost while searching for a mate, do not spray and are less likely to bite or become aggressive. These are all great reasons to spay or neuter your pet while helping to reduce pet overpopulation.

Concerned about a feral cat?

Become a feral cat caretaker through the MARYLAND SPCA: Provide food and shelter to stray/feral cats and increase public awareness of the plight of stray/feral or un-owned cats. You can help reduce colony numbers by working to spay and neuter animals in the neighborhood as well as providing and participating in stray/feral kitten litter socialization and adoption. Four of the ASPCA's Top 10 Tips for Cold Weather

- Never leave your dog or cat alone in a car during cold weather. A car can act as a refrigerator in the winter, holding in the cold and causing the animal to freeze to death.
- Make sure your companion animal has a warm place to sleep off the floor and away from all drafts. A cozy dog or cat bed with a warm blanket or pillow is perfect.
- Does your dog spend a lot of time engaged in outdoor activities? Increase his supply of food, particularly protein, to keep him and his fur in tip-top shape.
- Keep your cat inside. Outdoors, felines can freeze, can get lost or stolen, injured or killed. Cats who are allowed to stray are exposed to infectious diseases, including rabies, from other cats, dogs and wildlife.

An Ounce of Prevention

There have been some recent home burglaries and thefts from vehicles in Sudbrook Park and adjacent neighborhoods. Thefts of copper pipes and gutters from unoccupied homes have also been reported. Here are some things you can do to keep your home and family safe:

- Watch out for unusual activity. If you see something suspicious movement inside when a home should be empty... a strange car or truck in the driveway... a loiterer call the police (911) immediately.
- Consider installing motion-activated lights at the rear or sides of your home. They use less energy than constantly burning lights, and provide light when it is most needed.
- Keep doors and windows locked. Amazingly 30 to 50 percent of burglaries occur because a door or window was left unlocked. Lock doors and windows as a matter of habit even if going out for only a few minutes.
- When you are planning a trip, ask a neighbor to pick up your mail and newspapers and keep them for you until you return. Uncollected mail suggests that no one is home.



Crime Tip-

Shop Safely This Holiday Season. Holiday time is an especially busy time for criminals preying on people concentrating more on buying that perfect gift than on their surroundings. As a reminder, here are a few safety tips for shoppers to follow at Holiday time *and* throughout the year...

- Carry Purses Close to Your Body A purse dangling by your side makes it easier for thieves to run by and grab it.
- Don't Carry Valuable Items You Don't Need Keep credit cards and large sums of cash you're not using at home
- Don't Carry A Lot of Packages at Once This makes you an easy target
- Walk and Park in Highly-Visible or Busy, Well-Lit Areas It's also better to walk closer to the street, rather than close to buildings. Opportunists hide in building recesses to wait for a victim to rob.
